Points North and East For April 2017

2017 continues as a spectacular year for substantial rainfall and winds. "Aussie Oaks" cleanup continues. Also the Sierra continues to receive almost twice normal snowfall. Mammoth Mountain will be open for skiing until the Fourth of July! The Sierra is expecting a historic spring snow melt and flooding and Tioga Pass may not be open until July.

By mid March, the wildflowers appearing at Shell Creek usually peak with extensive coverage and about a dozen colors and two dozen varieties. This has not yet happened this year. The Central Coast wildflower locations, Big Sur wildflowers locations, and vernal pools usually peak in March but sometimes do not peak until early April. The Sealth image, "Santa Cruz Shoreline (SR051)", shows when the waves impact the shoreline near Santa Cruz, on the Central California's Coast, the rocks come alive from the spray.

Hopefully April takes me to Mammoth Lakes via Kern River Canyon, Walker Pass, Upper Mojave, and Owens Valley. I will be looking for wildflowers in these areas. The wildflowers of the Mojave Desert often peak during April. This includes Alabama Hills, Haiwee Creek, Aberdeen, Fossil Falls and Red Hill. Also this is a good time to check out the arches in the Alabama Hills area.

Depending on the snow pack at Mammoth, April is the best opportunity for "last snow" images. And through mid-June "last snow" and "ice breakup" may occur at June Lake Loop Lakes, Convict Lake, Mono Lake, Parker and Walker Lakes.

April is the best time to check out the many waterfalls and swimming holes at the lower elevations of the western sierra. This includes Bass Lake, Lewis Creek, Diana Pools, Rainbow Pools, and Foresta Falls. The waterfalls in the Yosemite area may be the biggest ever because of the extreme snow pack!

is coming up July 12 - 16, 2017



Guest Commentary:

Roger Ballen is one of the most critically acclaimed photographers of our time. I just received a copy of his book, "The Theater of Apparitions."

The following two paragraphs is an introduction by Colin Rhodes from the book.



"With a career spanning over four decades, Roger Ballen is best known for his psychologically powerful and masterfully composed images that exist in a space between painting, drawing, installation and photography. This book is both a departure from his existing oeuvre and the culmination of his unique aesthetic linking image-making and the theatrical performance. Separated into seven chapters or "acts," these Ballenesque images take readers on a journey deep into the subconscious.


Inspired by the sight of hand-drawn carvings on blacked-out windows in an abandoned women's prison, Ballen started to experiment using different spray paints on glass and then "drawing on" or removing the paint with a sharp object to let natural light through. The results are like prehistoric cave-paintings: the black, dimensionless spaces on the glass are canvases onto which Ballen carves his thoughts and emotions. Fossil-like facial forms and dismembered body parts co-exist uncomfortably with vaporous, ghost-like shadows - these images have the capacity to shock, inspire, amuse and even elate viewers. Timeless and innovative, earthly and otherworldly, physical and spiritual, his work transcends all traditional concepts of photography."

Of course, not everyone will like or appreciate this work nor do I expect that. However, I believe that having a broad general knowledge of art in general and photography in particular can only benefit the photographer.


